

2018–2019 VOCATIONAL SERVICE

- The Fellowship Luncheon Committee held two rounds of fellowship luncheons. In January, members had the option to visit Adsmith Marketing & Advertising, Community Blood Center of the Ozarks, Hydration Health Products, Ozarks Technical Community College, and Vib Hotel. In June, the options included Best of Luck Beer Hall, Computer Recycling Center, Meyer Alumni Center, and SMC Electric.
- The Four-Way Test Committee awarded the Four-Way Test award

to Brandi O'Reilly who was nominated by Abby Akin.

- The Rotary Volunteers Committee selected the Rotary Volunteer of the Year.
- The Vocational Awareness Committee recognized outstanding law enforcement and public service personnel from the Springfield Police Department, Springfield Fire Department, and the Greene County Sheriff's Office. A special touch to this year's program were videos that showed family and friends talking about each of the recipients.
- The Directory Committee updated and published the membership directory.

2018–2019 CLUB SERVICE

- The Public Relations Committee kept the club's Facebook page and website up to date with current information. A bio of every new member was published on the club Facebook page and on the club website. Several videos were created to highlight the club's activities.
- Southeast co-sponsored, along with the other Springfield Rotary clubs and the Rotaract club, a joint luncheon on May 8th. The speaker was Judge Tommy Webb.

2018–2019 COMMUNITY SERVICE

- Southeast provided leadership for the 20th Annual Rock'n Ribs BBQ Festival to benefit seven Springfield area children's charities.
- The Basketball Tournament Committee co-sponsored the 32nd Annual Rotary Basketball Tournament and raised over \$16,000 for Special Olympics. The Rotary teams played against each other where Southeast came out with a win. Rotarians also enjoyed a Special Olympics exhibition game.
- We had 28 donors in the Southeast Rotary Blood Drive held in the middle of August. For the Holiday Blood drive in January, which includes all of the Rotary clubs in Springfield, Southeast Rotary had 57 donors. This is a slight decrease from past years, but still represents the largest number of donors from any Springfield club.
- The Community Grants Committee awarded \$10,000 to the following organizations and projects:

- A district simplified grant with matching funds from Southeast Rotary was presented to the Drew Lewis Foundation in October. The \$12,000 helped with renovations to office space at the Fairbanks.
- The Hands-On Projects Committee organized a volunteer effort for 5-7 members to serve at the Fairbanks monthly by preparing and serving dinner for families participating in the Northwest Project.
- Southeast organized and facilitated The Fairbanks Community Fun Run event to serve as a fundriaser for the Fairbanks that raised \$6,000.

2018–2019 INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

- The Rotary Foundation Committee conducted a Rotary Foundation Program in November 2018 explaining the history, goals, and achievements of the Rotary Foundation.
- 154 Southeast members (74%) gave over \$33,441 to the Rotary Foundation, including \$1,205 to PolioPlus. We have 153 (73.6%) EREY members.
- Total all-time giving to the Rotary Foundation is over \$1,048,417. The average gift was \$141 per member versus the district average of \$120.
- Gordon Elliott hosted the PHF reception at his condo in May.
- The club World Community Service budget plus our auction provided a total of \$10,392, to be used for an international water project.
- The PolioPlus Committee conducted a weekly queen of hearts raffle to benefit the PolioPlus Fund of the Rotary Foundation. Total contributions were \$3,286 from the raffle.

2018–2019 NEW GENERATIONS

- The Interact Committee continued to advise and support the Interact Clubs at Glendale and Parkview High Schools. The students had a busy year. They help a great deal with Don't Meth With Us by putting the giveaway packs together for the elementary students, and they participate in presentations at all of the middle schools in Springfield. Each club also does a monthly service project. This year's projects include:
 - serving dinner at Ronald McDonald House,
 - volunteering at the Springfield Art Museum,
 - volunteering at the Fairbanks Fun Run hosted by Southeast,
 - volunteering at Rare Breed
 - volunteering at Convoy of Hope,
 - volunteering at Harmony House,
 - general cleanup projects at their respective schools,
 - making blankets for Newborns in Need, and
 - volunteering at Rock'n Ribs, which funds 12 local charities.
- The International Youth Exchange Committee, led by David Pomerenke, oversaw an inbound student this year and made sure

that she had three excellent families to stay with during her time in the U.S. We also hosted an outbound student. The committee has found an inbound student that will be attending Glendale High School for the 2019-20 school year and is in the process of selecting families for him to stay with during his visit.

- The Rotaract Committee, led by Meredith Bosso, continued to have a close relationship with the Springfield Rotaract Club. Rotaract members regularly attend Southeast meetings and our members often attend their meetings. We also had a joint social event with Rotaract at Mother's Brewery, which helps keep the bonds strong.
- The RYLA Committee selected and sponsored two high school students to attend Rotary Youth Leadership Academy. Thanks to Laurie Edmondson for leading this effort.
- Jon Baker continued to work as the leader of the Scholarship Committee with the other area clubs on behalf of the club as a part of the citywide effort.
- The Student Guests Committee hosted senior student guests from all of the local high schools monthly throughout the year to recognize their efforts. The club also recognized children and grandchildren of members for graduates day in late May as tradition holds. Thanks to Cindy Howell and Scott Haney for heading up this committee.

DON'T METH WITH US

- Twenty-one Southeast Rotarians actively participated in Don't Meth With Us Committee activities this year, providing the following services to our community:
 - 37 presentations reaching all 2,000 SPS 5th graders
 - 48 presentations reaching all 2,000 SPS 7th graders working with Glendale and Parkview Interact Clubs
 - 6 presentations reaching all 2,000 SPS 10th graders
- The Committee extended DMWU to Republic and Nixa.

ROTARY CLUB OF SPRINGFIELD SOUTHEAST ENDOWMENT, INC.

• The Rotary Club of Springfield Southeast Endowment, Inc. was established in 2015 as an independent 501(c)(3) to raise and disburse funds for issues of poverty, children, child abuse, housing, hunger, health, hygiene, education, and safety, plus the six areas of Rotary service in Springfield and the surrounding community.

- In 2017, the Founders Club was established for The Rotary Club of Springfield Southeast Endowment, Inc. Fifty-six Rotarians and the Rotary Club of Springfield Southeast contributed \$1,000 each to this fundraising campaign.
- The Sam and June Hamra Heritage Society was established for planned giving with a planned giving contribution from Sam and June Hamra of \$100,000 made to the Southeast Endowment.
- The Southeast Endowment has conducted an annual golf tournament and for the last two years has had a raffle for a luxury vacation.
- The Southeast Endowment has raised approximately \$106,000 to date.
- The Southeast Endowment has received commitments of approximately \$225,000 in planned giving gifts.

Rotary is dedicated to six areas of focus to build international relationships, improve lives, and create a better world to support our peace efforts and end polio forever.

PROMOTING PEACE

Rotary encourages conversations to foster understanding within and across cultures. We train adults and young leaders to prevent and mediate conflict and help refugees who have fled dangerous areas.

FIGHTING DISEASE

We educate and equip communities to stop the spread of life-threatening diseases like polio, HIV/AIDS, and malaria. We improve and expand access to low-cost and free health care in developing areas.

PROVIDING CLEAN WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE

We support local solutions to bring clean water, sanitation, and hygiene to more people every day. We don't just build wells and walk away. We share our expertise with community leaders and educators to make sure our projects succeed long-term.

SAVING MOTHERS AND CHILDREN

Nearly 6 million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation. We expand access to quality care, so mothers and their children can live and grow stronger.

SUPPORTING EDUCATION

More than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. Our goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy.

GROWING LOCAL ECONOMIES

We carry out service projects that enhance economic and community development and create opportunities for decent and productive work for young and old. We also strengthen local entrepreneurs and community leaders, particularly women, in impoverished communities.
